#### President's Message

This year has been another very good one for the Friends, with well-attended skills programmes and record participation in the hiking and camping Challenges. We also integrated a Christmas bird count and bird walks into the schedule of regular events, as well as finalizing informational plaques for some of the historic sites. Very many thanks to those who contributed their time and expertise for all of these very beneficial operations.

The year 2016 also brought some changes to the Friends and the Park. A recent major change was the retirement of Bert Korporaal. Bert has been Assistant Superintendent at the Park for thirty years, right from the start of its operations in its current form. He has worked with remarkable dedication from the early years of growth in facilities to support of Park operations. Bert helped in a multitude of ways: infrastructure planning and design, enforcement of regulations and serving as a regional source of expertise and training for Ontario Parks. His wealth of experience is irreplaceable and we are greatly in his debt not only for the work he undertook for the Park, but also the countless hours he spent supporting the Friends. Bert provided advice, led our annual volunteer training, worked on map production and collaborated on numerous Friends' projects. We have appreciated Bert's dedication, expertise, patience and perpetual good humour, and will miss him a great deal.

We also had some changes to our board over the course of the year. As noted in the last newsletter, Herb Helmstaedt retired earlier after eight years as President and more than a decade on the board. We are grateful that he continues in the role of Past President to offer support and guidance. Anne Hogle has stepped down after many years as Challenge Coordinator, and Patricia Gurnsey has taken on this task. We also said au revoir to Sigrid Ormiston, who stepped down as Secretary as she is going spend some time in Viet Nam. We welcome Chantal St.-Amour to the board to fill this role. Jerome McDuff was replaced by Peter Owens as Newsletter editor but continues to manage our website. The Board would like to give many thanks to all for their service and contributions.

Since the Friends is now 25 years old, it is a good time to reflect on some of the accomplishments we have made since 1991, even if, for some of us, it feels like no time at all. I am one of the people who served on the first elected board, and I am happy to say that a number of those who joined the Friends at start-up, and many who served on the board in the early years are still in the area and enjoying the Park. Some are even still involved in the Friends.

During the first years we were very active with the start-up of some of the fundamental things for which the Friends of Frontenac Park is known. The Newsletter, the first edition of the large-scale map and the interior volunteer trail maintenance programme were all generated in our first year of operation. These were followed by a focus on skills

programmes, Trail Centre hosting, and the Frontenac Challenge. Subsequent years saw the start of a Friends-organized store in the Park, creation of an animal and plant checklist, trail guide booklets, and the creation of new intermediate length trails. We then went from strength to strength with



contributions to the management plan, the purchase of canoes and construction materials, and the purchase of new land for the Park. We continue to be a very active organization with an ever-growing list of events and accomplishments and a strong corps of active volunteers.

## **Bert Korporaal Retires**

"Frontenac will be a different place without Bert there" (Ben Chabot, 23-Nov-2016). Yes, Bert Korporaal has retired and the friendly familiar face that many of us have seen so many times at the park office is no longer present.

Bert has had a 40 and a half year career with the MNR/Ontario Parks and trying to summarize all his involvement and accomplishments in a short article will not do him justice – so I picked a few moments that I think are particularly interesting.

Bert graduated twice from Sir Sandford Fleming College in Peterborough; once from Forestry and again from Fish & Wildlife Biology. Later in his career, Bert graduated from the Ontario Police College. At 22, he left a lucrative job in the automotive industry to join the Ministry of Natural Resources (about 70% drop in salary – Bert said jokingly "I guess I was not very good at Math") where he began his career in the northern Ontario town of Hearst working for Fish & Wildlife on the fish contaminant testing program among other things.

In between a couple of short stints in the Niagara area, Bert permanently moved to the Sioux Lookout District – a region he fell in love with and forged the foundation of his long and fruitful career. Even today he reminisces fondly of his time up there: "I miss it, I don't think a day goes by that I don't miss the north; but if you have to be in the south, Frontenac is the place you want to be". No wonder Bert is attached to the north, he did so many remarkable jobs up there. For example, Bert was the last Canoe Ranger for the Northwest paddling, mapping, and documenting all the major canoe routes from Lake Nipigon west almost to the Manitoba border and north to Hudson Bay. He then produced canoe route maps and pamphlets for rivers such as the English, Fawn, Albany, Attawapiskat, and Severn. In those days Bert recounts that they had to draw everything by hand in India ink no less – none of that digital stuff. No wonder Bert is the neatest writer and sketcher I ever met! Later the Friends of Frontenac Park benefited directly from his love and experience in cartography. More than anyone, Bert was responsible for the production of all five editions of the Friends' Park Map. Each Friends' map committee relied heavily on his knowledge and suggestions – he was the leader. He spent countless hours proofing, editing, and



improving the map. Thanks Bert, for your commitment.

Enforcement is also one of Bert's loves. This also had its genesis in the Sioux Lookout area where he first assisted in Fish & Wildlife enforcement. Bert is particularly proud of his Deputy Conservation Officer's badge – he has had it for over 25 years, "probably the longest living DCO in the province" as he says. I had the pleasure of watching Bert at work – checking fishing licenses on Birch Lake – and was surprised, that although firm, he was also fair and helpful, for example by giving pointers to some inexperienced fishermen. Taking an opportunity to educate is one of his most admirable traits, along with his belief in the proper stewardship of our lands and waters.

For three winters in the North, Bert was in charge of the construction and maintenance of over 560 km of ice roads connecting various isolated indigenous communities. These communities were dependent on these roads for fuel for the schools, airstrips and diesel generators, building supplies, dry goods, non-perishables items, and much more. For this work, Bert was based in the community of Weagamow Lake. If like me you don't know where that is, start at Sioux-Lookout and go nearly straight north about

320 km as the crow flies. It was while at Weagamow Lake that Bert met Julie, a girl from southwestern Ontario, who was there for three weeks on a practice teaching assignment in Native Studies. One can say that love brought Bert back to the south, as we say in French "chercher la femme." Bert applied for a position in Charleston Lake and was offered assistant-superintendent at Frontenac Park. He started work in April 1986, saying he intended to head back to the Northwest, "I am only coming here for one year, two years max; because, how can you leave heaven to come back to southern Ontario?" That was over 30 years ago! Bert and Julie married and are the proud parents of Jonah and Elias.

Bert brought with him a large bank of knowledge gained from the diversity of tasks he tackled in the north. At Frontenac, Bert has done it all. He was involved in many aspects of Park operations and management, including: hiring, training, fisheries management, and establishing many of the trail systems and campsites. As Bert was also known to keep very intricate notes and records, he became the scribe for many task teams, committees and meetings. Bert was also the Ontario Parks and MNR liaison with the Courts, enforcement branches, the OPP, and Indian Affairs. You see some of Bert's handy work each time you look at the Park Information Guide – Bert was lead in the production of this annual tabloid for the past 25 years or so, a job he thoroughly enjoyed.

Bert thrives on interacting with the public. One of his famous quotes is "In the north you manage resources, but here in the south, you manage people". On one occasion, I was with him in a boat on Kingsford Lake when someone from a nearby cottage waved to invite him for coffee and a chat. Naturally, Bert knew the cottager and his wife by name and they genuinely enjoyed Bert's company. We were just back on the water, when another cottager called Bert to come over for tea and cookies which he was happy to accept. After I commented that we were not getting much done today, Bert replied that "Keeping up a good relationship with Park neighbours is all part of the job." Interaction with the public is essential to him. This is why he enjoyed working on children's fishing derbies and sports and trade shows. Bert believes in the importance of teaching proper camping etiquette and the respect of nature to young people. One time I was with him on the trail when we met a father and his young son. The child was picking wild flowers and Bert, in a friendly way, gently

explained to the boy the impact on the park if everyone picked flowers. Education of park visitors in the wise and ethical use of the lands and waters has always been one of his primary goals.

Bert believes that "good training is the key" to produce good workers. Not only did he organize many courses and workshops for Frontenac Park staff, but also for other parks, MNR, MOE (Ministry of the Environment) staff and for the O.P.P. Naturally, Bert also arranged the annual volunteer training day that many of us have attended for as long as I can remember. Bert has a real passion for black bears and after 38 years of dealing with them, he respects them more than ever. The volunteer training day always involved a section about safety in black bear country along with a dose of Bert's good bear stories.

Bert has been a strong supporter of the Friends of Frontenac Park. He is always ready to assist and give suggestions. He enjoys working with park volunteers whether on trail sweeps or a bridge building outing. No one would be surprised to learn that Bert drew the plans (impeccable drawings as usual) for most of the 200+ footbridges and walkways in the Park and he was the construction foreman on the majority of them. Bert also wrote articles for the Friends' newsletter, and this fall, while dealing with his impending retirement, was helping with the Friends' Historical Plaque project.

Many years ago Bert's father told him, "When you go to your job and at the end of the day it did not feel like work, then you are truly blessed." That's what his career has been like for Bert. Always dedicated, he never counted the hours.


So some of his passions are: bears, health & safety, training and education, enforcement, publication production, cartography, interaction with the public, mentorship, and... I almost forgot - laughing.

Apparently, his dad also told him, "You need to have at least one really good laugh every day." and "You need to learn at least one thing every day, that way you did not get up for nothing." Bert lived by these words.

Yes, Frontenac will be a different place without Bert there but as Ben Chabot said, "You will always be there in spirit." Be proud of what you have accomplished, Bert, and have fun in this new stage of your life. As you said, "Life is much too short, make everything count". Stay healthy, keep in touch and thank you for 30 plus years of dedication at Frontenac Park and for your friendship.
